Book Review "The God I Don't Understand"

There are few advantages of lockdown. One of them is to catch up on some reading. I rarely ever recommend a book but in these strange times I would like to encourage you to read "The God I Don't Understand" by Chris Wright. Dr Wright is International Director of the Langham Partnership International and one of the country's leading theologians.

In the book he explores four of the most difficult subjects Christians generally face: the problem of evil, the genocide of Joshua, how people in the 21st century can make sense of the cross, and prophecies about the end of the world. The author is thoroughly committed to the supreme authority of Scripture. At the same time he faces with integrity the problems of biblical interpretation. There are many things we don't understand about God. We do not have final answers to the deep problems of life. There are areas of mystery in our Christian faith. In this book we are encouraged to face up to the limitations of our understanding. Chris Wright is a gift to the church and this book is a gift to all of us who care enough about our faith to question it. I commend this book.

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Seeing clearly



John 3:16-21

¹⁶ For God so loved the world that he gave his one and only Son, that whoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life. ¹⁷ For God did not send his Son into the world to condemn the world, but to save the world through him. ¹⁸ Whoever believes in him is not condemned, but whoever does not believe stands condemned already because they have not believed in the name of God's one and only Son. ¹⁹ This is the verdict: Light has come into the world, but people loved darkness instead of light because their deeds were evil. ²⁰ Everyone who does evil hates the light, and will not come into the light for fear that their deeds will be exposed. ²¹ But whoever lives by the truth comes into the light, so that it may be seen plainly that what they have done has been done in the sight of God.

It feels as though none of us can see clearly at the moment. We do not know how long the pandemic will last or when the vaccines will start working. It is difficult to plan for the future. We are stumbling in the dark. This passage contains an important phrase about Jesus being sent to save us and goes on to say that Jesus is like light coming into a dark place.

A Christian is not a perfect person but someone who sees clearly that Jesus is the light and we need that light in our lives. Despite the darkness around us, that Light has come into the world, and we can step into it and live by it.

We need to switch on that light in our own lives and then take another look around.
