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Things seem to change from day to day at the moment. I was planning to spend this morning leading the Mothering Sunday service which I admit was a bit daunting as I am not everyone's idea of a mum. I am sorry it did not go ahead and thank you to everyone who worked on it. **Next Sunday, SJB, Stone will be open for prayers and bible reading here at 10 30**

However the readings and prayers for Mothering Sunday are just right for us. This is what God says

2 Corinthians 1:3-4

Praise be to the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ. God is the Father who is full of mercy. And he is the God of all comfort. He comforts us every time we have trouble, so that we can comfort others when they have trouble. We can comfort them with the same comfort that God gives us.

Read it a couple of times. The message is simple. God cares for us. He comforts us so we can comfort others. That is a word for today.

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The second reading reminds us of God's love and the love of a mother

About this time, a man and woman from the tribe of Levi got married. The woman became pregnant and gave birth to a son. She saw that he was a special baby and kept him hidden for three months. But when she could no longer hide him, she got a basket made of papyrus reeds and waterproofed it with tar and pitch. She put the baby in the basket and laid it among the reeds along the bank of the Nile River. The baby's sister then stood at a distance, watching to see what would happen to him.

Soon Pharaoh's daughter came down to bathe in the river, and her attendants walked along the riverbank. When the princess saw the basket among the reeds, she sent her maid to get it for her. When the princess opened it, she saw the baby. The little boy was crying, and she felt sorry for him. "This must be one of the Hebrew children," she said.

Then the baby's sister approached the princess. "Should I go and find one of the Hebrew women to nurse the baby for you?" she asked.

"Yes, do!" the princess replied. So the girl went and called the baby's mother.

"Take this baby and nurse him for me," the princess told the baby's mother. "I will pay you for your help." So the woman took her baby home and nursed him.

Later, when the boy was older, his mother brought him back to Pharaoh's daughter, who adopted him as her own son. The princess named him Moses, for she explained, "I lifted him out of the water."

It is a well-known story and it shows the lengths a mother would go to, to look after a child. She even gave him away. As Christians we believe that God gave His Son for us. The greatest love is His and in Easter we find the depths of His love.

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Another of the prayers for today is appropriate as well.

Dear Jesus,

We thank you for mothers and carers everywhere, and for the special love they have for their children. We thank you, Jesus, for your special care and comfort and the perfect love you have for us all. Help us all to show your love to those who care for us, and to the people that we meet in our lives. Amen

I expect things will change in the next few days or weeks. It is an opportunity for the church to show that what we believe is real.
