BELONG - BELIEVE - BUILD - WITH CHRIST AS THE CORNERSTONE

'Everything is permissible' – but not everything is beneficial. 'Everything is permissible' – but not everything is constructive. Nobody should seek his own good, but the good of others.

These words were written not by the Prime Minister, nor by Professor Chris Whitty, the Chief Medical Officer, but by the Apostle Paul, somewhere around 54AD (I Corinthians 10:23-24).

As we take responsibility for more decisions about how we act in the remaining phase of the pandemic, this is a very good principle to follow. Just because I am allowed to do something, it does not necessarily mean I should do it. I need to think about whether what I do puts me or someone else at unnecessary risk of getting sick. I also need to be sensitive to the fears and concerns of others. For some people, the relaxation in restrictions will feel threatening and make them even more reluctant to go out and meet others.

Today, in the service at 10.30, we will be reading these passages: **Matthew 20:20-28** and **Acts 11:27-12:2** and thinking about the ways in which Jesus' followers thought and made decisions changed following his death and resurrection. If you can, you might like to look at these readings beforehand, and think about how the pandemic has changed our thinking.

Having looked at our facilities and taken account of the case rates for Covid 19 in this area, we feel that a responsible approach to church services at the moment is as follows:

- The wearing of face coverings will be optional whilst sitting in the pews
- Singing is allowed, but we will ask you to use a face covering for singing for now
- We will ask that you still wear a face covering when you are close to other people (eg entering and exiting the church)
- We will keep alternate pews cordoned off to allow 1m social distancing for now
- We will keep doors open during services to improve ventilation
- We recommend that worshippers still add their name and phone number to a "track and trace" form, or log into the NHS Track and Trace app. This information will be kept for 3 weeks after each service

Once case rates have come down to a lower level, we will review these principles further

### Matthew 20:20-28 - A Mother's Request

<sup>20</sup> Then the mother of Zebedee's sons came to Jesus with her sons and, kneeling down, asked a favour of him.

<sup>21</sup> "What is it you want?" he asked. She said, "Grant that one of these two sons of mine may sit at your right and the other at your left in your kingdom."

<sup>22</sup> "You don't know what you are asking," Jesus said to them. "Can you drink the cup I am going to drink?"

"We can," they answered.

<sup>23</sup> Jesus said to them, "You will indeed drink from my cup, but to sit at my right or left is not for me to grant. These places belong to those for whom they have been prepared by my Father."

<sup>24</sup> When the ten heard about this, they were indignant with the two brothers.

 $^{25}$  Jesus called them together and said, "You know that the rulers of the Gentiles lord it over them, and their high officials exercise authority over them.  $^{26}$  Not so with you. Instead, whoever wants to become great among you must be your servant,  $^{27}$  and whoever wants to be first must be your slave— $^{28}$  just as the Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many."

#### Acts 11:27-12:2

<sup>27</sup> During this time some prophets came down from Jerusalem to Antioch. <sup>28</sup> One of them, named Agabus, stood up and through the Spirit predicted that a severe famine would spread over the entire Roman world. (This happened during the reign of Claudius.) <sup>29</sup> The disciples, as each one was able, decided to provide help for the brothers and sisters living in Judea. <sup>30</sup> This they did, sending their gift to the elders by Barnabas and Saul.

12 It was about this time that King Herod arrested some who belonged to the church, intending to persecute them $^{-2}$  He had James, the brother of John, put to death with the sword
