

Bucks Safe Haven is an out-of-hours crisis support service run by Buckinghamshire Mind in partnership with Oxford Health NHS Foundation Trust. They provide support by telephone and video call seven evenings a week between 6.00pm – 12 midnight.

They offer time to talk, think or simply 'be' during a crisis. Individuals accessing Safe Haven do not need to have accessed Adult Mental Health Services or Buckinghamshire Mind before.

Anyone wishing to receive support from Safe Haven must call from 6pm onwards on the night support is needed. Calls to the service should be made by 11pm where possible, to ensure adequate time for support.

Jesus presented in the temple - Luke chapter 2

²² When the time came for the purification rites required by the Law of Moses, Joseph and Mary took him to Jerusalem to present him to the Lord ²³ (as it is written in the Law of the Lord, 'Every firstborn male is to be consecrated to the Lord'), ²⁴ and to offer a sacrifice in keeping with what is said in the Law of the Lord: 'a pair of doves or two young pigeons'. ²⁵ Now there was a man in Jerusalem called Simeon, who was righteous and devout. He was waiting for the consolation of Israel, and the Holy Spirit was on him. ²⁶ It had been revealed to him by the Holy Spirit that he would not die before he had seen the Lord's Messiah. ²⁷ Moved by the Spirit, he went into the temple courts. When the parents brought in the child Jesus to do for him what the custom of the Law required, ²⁸ Simeon took him in his arms and praised God, saying:



²⁹ 'Sovereign Lord, as you have promised,
you may now dismiss your servant in peace.
³⁰ For my eyes have seen your salvation,
³¹ which you have prepared in the sight of all nations:
³² a light for revelation to the Gentiles,
and the glory of your people Israel.'

Candlemas 2021 is on Tuesday 2 February. It is the day we remember when the baby Jesus was presented in the Temple. Mary and Joseph were devout and wanted the best for Him. For Jewish people this was a family event but nothing out of the ordinary.

I wonder if Simeon had a hard time. He believed the Messiah would come in his lifetime and he would meet Him. I doubt he kept that belief to himself so others may have made fun of him. They probably believed the Messiah would come one day, but not any time soon. They would have expected him to visit the Temple like a superstar, and He would not have time to bother with an old man like Simeon and a young couple with a baby.

People experience religion in different ways. Sometimes God comes to us in an unexpected way. Simeon had a simple but unshakeable faith that he would meet the saviour. He did not know how, or what he would do, but he knew it would happen. Jesus is full of surprises, He comes to us in ways and at times we do not expect. The Holy Spirit will prompt us to be in the right place at the right time if we expect him to. Simeon's reward for all the years of belief, despite all the evidence to the contrary, is to meet God. Simeon was right, Jesus is a revelation.
