Eryl has done so much for us and with us, from Guiding to Music – but especially holding the reigns through transitions of clergy and the formation of the Wychert Vale Benefice. We now know what money we have, which account it is in, and – also due to your generosity – that we can pay our basics. Naomi has spent hours applying for grants and we have around £35,000 for the facilities from those grants we would not have had without her. Thank you, Naomi.

Neil Chudley has also stepped down as a churchwarden in SPP, but is to continue on PCC as the Safeguarding Officer for the Parish.

We welcomed Richard Smith as Church Warden. Richard is going to take on the role for a transition year and we are looking for new leadership. He will be supported by our PCC.

Thank you for all your support over 2020 and we look to a full reopening later this year.

Tom Wright's talk at the Parliamentary Prayer Breakfast

The National Parliamentary Prayer Breakfast was last Friday on YouTube live. It was a good event, and it has been lovely to hear that some of you were able to join me in attending virtually. Tom Wright was the speaker, and you can listen to his excellent tenminute talk here: https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=dpyB-yal6cg

Tom spoke about three markers for life after Covid that as Christians who want to help our whole society replace despair with hope we should be thinking about: 'lament, forgiveness and rebuilding.'

Our lamenting with society for all the pain of suffering of the last year, he says, grows out of the belief that the world is not as God created it to be and therefore our lamenting comes out of a place of fresh and creative hope. Tom pointed out that our society has forgotten the need for forgiveness and we cast ourselves as victims. This means that instead of finger pointing we enter our reviews of the last year looking to forgive and make amendment. Finally he said that the kind of rebuilding found in the Bible calls us to prioritise the needs of the poor and the marginalised. Now he was speaking about policy in the nation but we can equally apply this to our own rebuilding in our lives, church and communities. In our own spheres of influence, how can we bring kingdom values into our rebuilding?

Mark 6:1-6 A prophet without honour

1 Jesus left there and went to his home town, accompanied by his disciples.
2 When the Sabbath came, he began to teach in the synagogue, and many who heard him were amazed.

'Where did this man get these things?' they asked. 'What's this wisdom that has been given him? What are these remarkable miracles he is performing? 3 Isn't this the carpenter? Isn't this Mary's son and the brother of James, Joseph, Judas and Simon? Aren't his sisters here with us?' And they took offence at him.

4 Jesus said to them, 'A prophet is not without honour except in his own town, among his relatives and in his own home.' 5 He could not do any miracles there, except lay his hands on a few people who were ill and heal them. 6 He was amazed at their lack of faith.

It is often the case that the hometown of any celebrity will be proud and even boastful of the connection with its famous sons (remember the gold letterboxes after the 2012 London Olympics?) However, this is not so when Jesus returns to his home town - even though it is clear the people are amazed by his wisdom and miracles. Sometimes we are more willing to listen to a charismatic stranger than to a hometown boy (who does he think he is?) That seems to be the case here - the people of Nazareth could not see Jesus as anyone more than Mary's son the carpenter.

Whatever their reasons it is clear that the people in this passage have no faith in Jesus, despite being amazed by his wisdom and the miracles they have heard about. And their lack of faith means he is not able to do any miracles there. There is a difference between having just a little faith in Jesus (the size of a mustard seed), and choosing to have no faith at all. Jesus can work with mustard seed faith, and he can work miracles in our lives if we believe that he can and if we choose to put our trust in Him. It is our choice.



Loving God, kindle the spark of faith within us until the fire of your love burns brightly in our hearts, blazing for your glory. May we awake each day with hope in our heart and live each moment rejoicing in your love. Amen
