## John 6:35, 41-51

6:35 Jesus said to them, "I am the bread of life. Whoever comes to me will never be hungry, and whoever believes in me will never be thirsty.

6:41 Then the Jews began to complain about him because he said, "I am the bread that came down from heaven."

6:42 They were saying, "Is not this Jesus, the son of Joseph, whose father and mother we know? How can he now say, 'I have come down from heaven'?"

6:43 Jesus answered them, "Do not complain among yourselves.

6:44 No one can come to me unless drawn by the Father who sent me; and I will raise that person up on the last day.

6:45 It is written in the prophets, 'And they shall all be taught by God.' Everyone who has heard and learned from the Father comes to me.

6:46 Not that anyone has seen the Father except the one who is from God; he has seen the Father.

6:47 Very truly, I tell you, whoever believes has eternal life.

6:48 I am the bread of life.

6:49 Your ancestors ate the manna in the wilderness, and they died.

6:50 This is the bread that comes down from heaven, so that one may eat of it and not die.

6:51 I am the living bread that came down from heaven. Whoever eats of this bread will live forever; and the bread that I will give for the life of the world is my flesh."

Have you ever thought what it would have been like to be in the crowd seeing and hearing Jesus first hand? To have witnessed miracles and heard his teaching before anyone else? Surely it would be much easier to believe in him than it is for us in the distant modern age?

Well no, not necessarily.

Last week we heard how the crowds followed Jesus to the other side of the lake, clamouring for a sign from him. Despite his own need for some rest and relaxation he did not turn them away.

Yet only a few verses later they have started to grumble. They complained when he said 'I am the bread that came down from heaven', because they already knew him to be the son of Joseph and Mary. Knowing his background and his human parents seems to highlight their ignorance of their Father in heaven, and they cannot get beyond what they think they already know.

Jesus says in verse 44 'no one can come to me unless drawn by the Father who sent me......' That is as true for us today as it was for the people in the crowd back then.

In the final verse of the reading Jesus adds an important word to his claim to be bread from heaven. This time he says he is the **living** bread that came down from heaven. By talking about **living** bread Jesus makes it clear he is not simply referring back to the manna from heaven that sustained their ancestors in the past. Now he is pointing them to his Father and what he will do for them in the future. Before the gospel story is complete Jesus will literally give up his body for the life of the world.



We have the advantage of having read ahead to the last page, so we can understand what Jesus is referring to!
