Stir up Sunday

Stir up Sunday is also the day when people traditionally 'stirred up' their Christmas puddings. That was in the days before they were available to buy (with much less effort) in the shops. So, today is the best day to dig out Grandma's old recipe for Christmas pudding if you want to impress the family with it on Christmas Day. To do it properly though you should follow these rules:

- 1. Every member of the family should have a turn at stirring the pudding.
- 2. There should be 13 ingredients to represent Jesus and each of his disciples.
- You must stir from East to West because the Wise Men Came from the East. Whether this means clockwise or anticlockwise is for your family to debate. Do not go straight across the middle though as this would not qualify as 'stirring'.

Luke 23:33-43

³³ When they came to the place called the Skull, they crucified him there, along with the criminals – one on his right, the other on his left. ³⁴ Jesus said, 'Father, forgive them, for they do not know what they are doing.' And they divided up his clothes by casting lots.

³⁵ The people stood watching, and the rulers even sneered at him. They said, 'He saved others; let him save himself if he is God's Messiah, the Chosen One.'

³⁶ The soldiers also came up and mocked him. They offered him wine vinegar ³⁷ and said, 'If you are the king of the Jews, save yourself.'

³⁸ There was a written notice above him, which read: this is the king of the Jews.

³⁹ One of the criminals who hung there hurled insults at him: 'Aren't you the Messiah? Save yourself and us!'

⁴⁰ But the other criminal rebuked him. 'Don't you fear God,' he said, 'since you are under the same sentence?⁴¹ We are punished justly, for we are getting what our deeds deserve. But this man has done nothing wrong.'

⁴² Then he said, 'Jesus, remember me when you come into your kingdom.'

⁴³ Jesus answered him, 'Truly I tell you, today you will be with me in paradise.'

All the onlookers were mocking Jesus – the rulers in v35, the soldiers in v36, the authorities in v38, and even one of the criminals in v39. Once a crowd gets going they egg each other on. Ironically, Jesus <u>could</u> have saved himself (v35) but he chose not to. He knew he was dying in order to save others and to save us. The righteous was dying for the unrighteous.

Notice though the contrasting reactions of the two criminals to Jesus as this highlights the decision we all need to make for ourselves. We can remain part of the crowd and reject Jesus, or we can put our faith in Him despite the mockery around us. The passage does however give us hope. We can see that from the moment we truly recognise our sin and turn to Jesus we can receive total forgiveness. This criminal did nothing to earn his forgiveness. He had no opportunity to be baptised or even to go to church. He simply put his faith in Jesus, and Jesus recognised this by responding 'Truly I tell you, **today** you will be with me in paradise'. So if we truly turn to Jesus at any time, or anywhere, it is never too late to receive forgiveness.
