The gospel reading for today is from Matthew 13

The Parable of the Weeds (verses 24-30)

²⁴ Jesus told them another parable: "The kingdom of heaven is like a man who sowed good seed in his field. ²⁵ But while everyone was sleeping, his enemy came and sowed weeds among the wheat, and went away. ²⁶ When the wheat sprouted and formed heads, then the weeds also appeared.

²⁷ "The owner's servants came to him and said, 'Sir, didn't you sow good seed in your field? Where then did the weeds come from?'

"The servants asked him, 'Do you want us to go and pull them up?'

²⁹ "'No,' he answered, 'because while you are pulling the weeds, you may uproot the wheat with them. ³⁰ Let both grow together until the harvest. At that time I will tell the harvesters: First collect the weeds and tie them in bundles to be burned; then gather the wheat and bring it into my barn.'"

The Parable of the Weeds Explained (verses 36-43)

³⁶ Then he left the crowd and went into the house. His disciples came to him and said, "Explain to us the parable of the weeds in the field."

³⁷ He answered, "The one who sowed the good seed is the Son of Man. ³⁸ The field is the world, and the good seed stands for the people of the kingdom. The weeds are the people of the evil one, ³⁹ and the enemy who sows them is the devil. The harvest is the end of the age, and the harvesters are angels.



⁴⁰ "As the weeds are pulled up and burned in the fire, so it will be at the end of the age. ⁴¹ The Son of Man will send out his angels, and they will weed out of his kingdom everything that causes sin and all who do evil. 42 They will throw them into the blazing furnace, where there will be weeping and gnashing of teeth. 43 Then the righteous will shine like the sun in the kingdom of their Father. Whoever has ears, let them hear.

This parable follows a similar pattern of teaching to the parable of the Sower. Jesus uses an example from everyday life and then gives an explanation of its meaning. The parable of the weeds tells us something about God's attitude to good and evil. Since He only sows goodness in the world it must be frustrating to Him to see all the bad things that are happening amongst all the good He has done. For example - we can appreciate the beauty of His creation but be discouraged by the way it is being abused – but why doesn't God do something about it – NOW?

It is not God who causes things to go wrong, it is us — corruption, greed, jealousy etc are often the root causes. In this parable God is warning us that our collective (and individual) actions have consequences, but He is also a compassionate God who gives us the time and opportunity to change.

We may feel powerless to change the policies of national leaders around the globe (a debate for another day!) but we are each responsible for how we live our own lives and the choices we make – and with God's help we can be changed – if we ask Him.

All the world is God's own field, fruit as praise to God we yield; Wheat and tares together sown are to joy or sorrow grown; First the blade and then the ear, then the full corn shall appear; Lord of harvest, grant that we - wholesome grain and pure May be.

For the Lord our God shall come, and shall take the harvest home; From His field shall in that day, all offences purge away, Giving angels charge at last In the fire the tares to cast; But the fruitful ears to store In the garner evermore.
