

Oops!

Avid pewsheet and lectionary readers will have spotted the mistake in last week's pewsheet. Amidst the excitement of a weekend away in Yorkshire the editor misread the rota of gospel readings and included the one set for today a week early. Apologies. So what shall we do this week? For once we could skip across to the old testament reading for today but as it is long we will just look at the first few verses.

Exodus 1:8-14

⁸ Then a new king, to whom Joseph meant nothing, came to power in Egypt. ⁹ 'Look,' he said to his people, 'the Israelites have become far too numerous for us. ¹⁰ Come, we must deal shrewdly with them or they will become even more numerous and, if war breaks out, will join our enemies, fight against us and leave the country.'

¹¹ So they put slave masters over them to oppress them with forced labour, and they built Pithom and Rameses as store cities for Pharaoh. ¹² But the more they were oppressed, the more they multiplied and spread; so the Egyptians came to dread the Israelites ¹³ and worked them ruthlessly. ¹⁴ They made their lives bitter with harsh labour in brick and mortar and with all kinds of work in the fields; in all their harsh labour, the Egyptians worked them ruthlessly.

This passage follows on from the account of how Egypt prospered under the wise rule of Joseph (the one with the colourful coat). His heritage should have been honoured but he was a foreigner, as were his people who settled in Egypt when there was famine in their own land. Egypt's prosperity rested on Joseph's wise rule, but when a new King came to power it was deliberately ignored and forgotten. The king turned the Egyptians against the Israelites by noting how they had multiplied and could "if war breaks out ... join our enemies and fight against us and leave the country" (vv.9-10). Instead of expelling them from Egypt though, his answer was to enslave and exploit them. If you read on from v.14 you will discover how the oppression gets even worse, even to the point of killing all Israelite baby boys.

What message of hope can we possibly take from this? To begin with we should not be surprised when our own secular society fails to remember blessings they have inherited from Christian influences in previous generations. Much in the way our society is organised rests on the Christian heritage of leaders who have tried to apply Biblical wisdom for the common good. This is often forgotten today at a time of national soul searching, just as it was in Egypt, yet at the same time the benefits from our Christian heritage are taken for granted.

Note also how despite increasing opposition, God's people still multiplied in number even as the Egyptians ever more ruthlessly oppressed them (vv.12-14).Our God is a faithful God who gives strength to his people to endure whatever hardships surround them; and his word continues to nourish and sustain those who seek Him.
