Today is also known as **BIBLE SUNDAY** when we celebrate the gift of God's word. The article below is a summary from resources supplied by the Bible Society. You can read the passage from Nehemiah by clicking this link

Nehemiah 8.1–11 is the story of the reading of the law to the people of Israel after their return from exile in Babylon. The reading of the Law was a key moment for them as they realised and reaffirmed their identity as God's people. The Law was written in Hebrew, but during their exile their everyday language had changed to Aramaic. Most of the people wouldn't have understood what they were hearing, so it was translated and explained for them.

Nehemiah and the priests had prepared carefully for this event. They had arranged for the Levites to explain the meaning of what was being read. These Levites would have had to study and discuss the text beforehand so they knew what to say. The whole event had been planned as a centrepiece for the foundation of this renewed community. It was built around God's word, and 'they all listened attentively' – for about six hours! (don't worry –David won't preach for that long today!)

The Levites 'gave an oral translation of God's Law and explained it so that the people could understand it' (verse 8). Verse 9 tells us that 'when the people heard what the Law required, they were so moved that they began to cry'. They were struck by the gap between what they ought to have been and what they were, and grieved at how they'd fallen short. But Nehemiah and Ezra tell them not to become obsessed with their sin but rather to enjoy and celebrate what the Lord had done for them. God's word convicts us of sin, but much more, it brings grace and the knowledge of love and forgiveness.

It was as the people gathered around God's word that they were bound together as a community. For us too, coming together around the Scriptures and sharing stories, hopes and fears can prove to be a restart moment. The Bible transforms lives because it is the written word that leads us to the living Word: 'The Word became flesh and made his dwelling among us' as John says in the prologue to his Gospel (John 1.14, NIV). As in Ezra and Nehemiah's day, the word of God is central to understanding our place in the world and how to live. It shows us that it is the truth and grace of Jesus Christ that is the hope of our lives and the hope of the world.

Question: in which UK public building can these words be found? (in Latin)

'Unless the Lord builds the house the builders labour in vain' (Psalm 127.1)

Answer: These words are inlaid in the floor of the Central Lobby in the Houses of Parliament in Westminster. They are a reminder that Scripture has informed, shaped and provided the foundations for our country. God's word is a strong foundation not just for a nation, but particularly for God's people as we know it and learn to live by it.



Lord You have called us to be your people, to follow where you lead, be obedient to your word and bring your Good News wherever we might go. Forgive the impatience and lack of faith which causes us to stumble, preferring our way to yours, relying on human wisdom rather than the truth which comes from you. Draw us back into your arms, as prodigals to our Father and grant us patience, perseverance, and a child-like faith in our journeying with you. Amen
