The lectionary gospel reading for today Matthew 10:40-42

⁴⁰ 'Anyone who welcomes you welcomes me, and anyone who welcomes me welcomes the one who sent me. ⁴¹ Whoever welcomes a prophet as a prophet will receive a prophet's reward, and whoever welcomes a righteous person as a righteous person will receive a righteous person's reward. ⁴² And if anyone gives even a cup of cold water to one of these little ones who is my disciple, truly I tell you, that person will certainly not lose their reward.'

In it Revd Phil tells a tremendous story of hospitality to illustrate this gospel reading. It is about a large group of (mainly) boys from South Sudan who were orphaned by the war that was raging in their country at that time. With no food and no homes the boys set off on a trek to find safety, and they headed south towards Nairobi which was thousands of miles away. Along the way they were given food and water by communities who had very little themselves.

On arrival in Nairobi what should they do? They knocked on the doors of the churches where they were given food and shelter; and the people of the diocese of Salisbury advocated for them. Eventually, many of them were offered homes in various cities in the USA and Canada through a resettlement programme.

So the 'Lost Boys' went straight from an impoverished lifestyle of a cattle rearing culture to one of the most advanced in the world; and there they went to the Anglican churches that were rich financially but struggling for numbers. Despite the culture clash they were offered hospitality, welcome, advice and hope.

What did those churches get in return? Suddenly these churches found they had an energy and vibrancy in worship they had not known before. They became refuges for the poor and the broken - people they had never engaged with before. They became advocates for the people of Sudan in the places of power in the heart of Washington, and they were part of the movement that led to South Sudan gaining its independence.

We are reminded that Jesus said blessing comes on those who offer hospitality. In our world today there are an enormous number of refugees, and that poses logistical problems. However, we should avoid the temptation to see them just as a threat. They can be a blessing too and they have the potential to rejuvenate our world.



Heavenly Father, teach us how to show hospitality and welcome in our church and in our lives just as you have told us to do. Help us to contribute to the needs of all people and to welcome strangers into our home. You have blessed us with more than we need. May our cup of blessings, which overflows quench the thirst of those in need. Amen.
