The Good Shepherd and His Sheep John 10:1-10

10 "Very truly I tell you Pharisees, anyone who does not enter the sheep pen by the gate, but climbs in by some other way, is a thief and a robber. ² The one who enters by the gate is the shepherd of the sheep. ³ The gatekeeper opens the gate for him, and the sheep listen to his voice. He calls his own sheep by name and leads them out. ⁴ When he has brought out all his own, he goes on ahead of them, and his sheep follow him because they know his voice. ⁵ But they will never follow a stranger; in fact, they will run away from him because they do not recognise a stranger's voice." ⁶ Jesus used this figure of speech, but the Pharisees did not understand what he was telling them.

⁷Therefore Jesus said again, "Very truly I tell you, I am the gate for the sheep. ⁸All who have come before me are thieves and robbers, but the sheep have not listened to them. ⁹I am the gate; whoever enters through me will be saved. They will come in and go out, and find pasture. ¹⁰The thief comes only to steal and kill and destroy; I have come that they may have life, and have it to the full.

Jesus uses rich images of daily life to illustrate the depth of his desired relationship with us. It was common practice at that time for the sheep of more than one shepherd to be enclosed overnight in the same pen. Each shepherd could identify his own though and the term 'know his voice' does not mean simply to recognise; it implies a deep bond, attachment and connection. The shepherd would then lead the way. He knows where to go. He knows the dangers to avoid. He keeps his own safe because they trust him completely.

Sometimes the only way to keep sheep safe at night was to make a pen by cutting thorn branches. Leaving a gap in the circle the shepherd then called them into the enclosure and slept across the gap. Here the shepherd is also literally the gate. Nobody can steal or harm those who are his own.

These are all comforting words that remind us of Psalm 23.

How do we learn to know the voice of Jesus in our own lives? It takes practice! There are so many other voices calling us, demanding our attention we can easily be led astray if we have not learned to 'know his voice'. Through daily prayer and reading of the scriptures we will get to discern for ourselves when other 'voices' are not right and will lead us into a blind alley. Yes sometimes we will get it wrong, but Jesus does not give up on us. We are his.

The good news is that Jesus came to give us life, and have it to the full. We have here a picture of total freedom together with total security.



Thankyou Jesus that you know us each by name and you lead us and keep us safe. Help us to always know your voice and to not be led astray by others. Amen

Thy Kingdom Come



Thy Kingdom Come (TKC) is the global ecumenical prayer movement that invites Christians around the world to pray from Ascension to Pentecost for more people to come to know Jesus.

Here in Stone we will be encouraging every person and household to pray during the 11 days from 18th May to 28th May either in their own home, or in church. This is how we plan to do it:

- 1. A **booklet of daily prayers** for our friends, families, and community will be available to everyone from Sunday 14th May.
- 2. We will ask people to pray the prayer for the day between 7pm and 7.30pm (or as close to that as they can) **wherever** they are.
- 3. The church will be open 7pm 7.30pm for anyone to come and pray there. Each day there will be a group of at least three people praying in church at that time. You can pray silently on your own or join the group in their prayers. The exception is Ascension Day (18th May) when we begin TKC with a service at SPP Dinton at 7.30pm.
