The gospel reading in the lectionary for today is from Matthew 13

We have read the parable of the sower, and the parable of the weeds and the wheat. Today the lectionary offers us more parables – this time to illustrate what the kingdom of heaven is like - something that it can be difficult for our minds to grasp. We will just look briefly at four of the parables for today because the parable of the net covers similar teaching to the parable of the weeds and the wheat from last week.

The Parables of the Mustard Seed and the Yeast



³¹ He told them another parable: "The kingdom of heaven is like a mustard seed, which a man took and planted in his field. ³² Though it is the smallest of all seeds, yet when it grows, it is the largest of garden plants and becomes a tree, so that the birds come and perch in its branches."

³³ He told them still another parable: "The kingdom of heaven is like yeast that a woman took and mixed into about sixty pounds-of flour until it worked all through the dough."

We already know from the scriptures that we only need faith the size of a mustard seed but here Jesus is telling us something different that would have been recognisable to his audience. The image of birds in branches appears a few times in the Old Testament where it represents people from all nations becoming part of God's family. So Jesus is saying the Kingdom of Heaven is for the whole world, not just for the Jewish people.

Then Jesus goes on to talk about yeast that works its way through the dough. We need to be that yeast. Our influence can be enormous in the world around us – in our homes, families, schools, offices and so on. This is how the transformation of society takes place. We may sometimes feel overwhelmed by all the wrongs in our society, and we may feel despair at how we can change that – but Jesus tells us our influence can be tremendously effective.

The Parables of the Hidden Treasure and the Pearl

⁴⁴ "The kingdom of heaven is like treasure hidden in a field. When a man found it, he hid it again, and then in his joy went and sold all he had and bought that field.

⁴⁵ "Again, the kingdom of heaven is like a merchant looking for fine pearls. ⁴⁶ When he found one of great value, he went away and sold everything he had and bought it.

Some people - like the merchant here - search desperately for God before they find him. Others - like the man in the field - seem to stumble across him without trying. We each come to faith in our own way and hearing the testimony of others can be a source of encouragement in our own journey of faith. Whichever way you find Him, His kingdom is worth giving up everything else for.



Generous God,

you give us gifts and make them grow, just like the yeast in the dough. Even though our faith is small as a mustard seed, we pray that you will make it grow to your glory, so that your kingdom may flourish.

Thankyou that your kingdom is open to all peoples.

Encourage us to show our faith in the way we live our lives, so that our families and friends may seek your kingdom too.

We long to see others turn to you, and to live as citizens of our kingdom.
