²⁴ 'But in those days, following that distress,

"the sun will be darkened. and the moon will not give its light; ²⁵ the stars will fall from the sky, and the heavenly bodies will be shaken."

²⁶ 'At that time people will see the Son of Man coming in clouds with great power and glory. ²⁷ And he will send his angels and gather his elect from the four winds, from the ends of the earth to the ends of the heavens.

²⁸ 'Now learn this lesson from the fig-tree: as soon as its twigs get tender and its leaves come out, you know that summer is near. ²⁹ Even so, when you see these things happening, you know that it is near, right at the door. ³⁰ Truly I tell you, this generation will certainly not pass away until all these things have happened. 31 Heaven and earth will pass away, but my words will never pass away.

³² 'But about that day or hour no one knows, not even the angels in heaven, nor the Son, but only the Father. ³³ Be on guard! Be alert! You do not know when that time will come. ³⁴ It's like a man going away: he leaves his house and puts his servants in charge, each with their assigned task, and tells the one at the door to keep watch.

³⁵ Therefore keep watch because you do not know when the owner of the house will come back – whether in the evening, or at midnight, or when the cock crows, or at dawn. ³⁶ If he comes suddenly, do not let him find you sleeping. ³⁷ What I say to you, I say to everyone: "Watch!"

Advent thoughts

Advent marks the beginning of the church year. The Church of England describes it as a time for reflection in darkness, for renewal of hope and for a movement towards a beginning.

The season of Advent, as it first emerged in the Church in the fourth and fifth centuries, lasted, like Lent, for 40 days. Later tradition developed the Advent we know today, of four Sundays before Christmas Day.

It is a season of expectation as the Church prepares to celebrate the coming of Christ. Church decorations are simple and sparse, and purple is the traditional colour used. Advent falls at the darkest time of the year, and the natural symbols of darkness and light are powerfully at work throughout Advent and Christmas.

Many of us will be thinking about Advent as being the time for frenzied Christmas preparations, so it can puzzling to understand why the gospel reading for Advent Sunday refers not to Jesus as a baby, but to his expected return at an unknown time. We are in effect celebrating the former at the same time as anticipating the latter.

In his book 'Advent for Everyone' the author Tom Wright describes the church year as like a bicycle wheel. Each year we go around – Advent, Christmas, Epiphany, Lent, Holy Week, Easter.....and so on. Then round we go again. But his point is that we are not simply going round and round and not getting anywhere. A bicycle wheel goes round and round but at the same time it moves us forward. It moves us on towards the eventual goal – the return of Jesus when He will put all things right.

That is the Advent hope.
