John 20:1-18

The empty tomb

¹ Early on the first day of the week, while it was still dark, Mary Magdalene went to the tomb and saw that the stone had been removed from the entrance. ² So she came running to Simon Peter and the other disciple, the one Jesus loved, and said, 'They have taken the Lord out of the tomb, and we don't know where they have put him!'



³ So Peter and the other disciple started for the tomb. ⁴ Both were running, but the other disciple outran Peter and reached the tomb first. ⁵ He bent over and looked in at the strips of linen lying there but did not go in. ⁶ Then Simon Peter came along behind him and went straight into the tomb. He saw the strips of linen lying there, ⁷ as well as the cloth that had been wrapped round Jesus' head. The cloth was still lying in its place, separate from the linen. ⁸ Finally the other disciple, who had reached the tomb first, also went inside. He saw and believed. ⁹ (They still did not understand from Scripture that Jesus had to rise from the dead.) ¹⁰ Then the disciples went back to where they were staying.

Jesus appears to Mary Magdalene

¹¹ Now Mary stood outside the tomb crying. As she wept, she bent over to look into the tomb ¹² and saw two angels in white, seated where Jesus' body had been, one at the head and the other at the foot.

¹³ They asked her, 'Woman, why are you crying?'

'They have taken my Lord away,' she said, 'and I don't know where they have put him.' ¹⁴ At this, she turned round and saw Jesus standing there, but she did not realise that it was Jesus.

¹⁵ He asked her, 'Woman, why are you crying? Who is it you are looking for?'

Thinking he was the gardener, she said, 'Sir, if you have carried him away, tell me where you have put him, and I will get him.'

¹⁶ Jesus said to her, 'Mary.'

She turned towards him and cried out in Aramaic, 'Rabboni!' (which means 'Teacher').

¹⁷ Jesus said, 'Do not hold on to me, for I have not yet ascended to the Father. Go instead to my brothers and tell them, "I am ascending to my Father and your Father, to my God and your God."'

¹⁸ Mary Magdalene went to the disciples with the news: 'I have seen the Lord!' And she told them that he had said these things to her.

When Cassa preached at our Benefice Maundy Thursday service, she highlighted a phrase I had not noticed before. The disciples could not stay awake because they were 'weary with sorrow.' Those words resonated with the Good Friday congregations in Stone and Cuddington. People murmured recognition that they and all around us are 'weary with sorrow'. Amidst the sadness brought on by the pandemic, the ongoing horror of war, and the immensity of natural disasters, as well as the cost of living, we need to have hope and good news.

The resurrection is that good news. It does not lessen the weight of sin, death, and law that pulled Jesus down to the grave. It does something more amazing – it breaks the chain.

Salvation stories often focus on Jesus paying the price of sin, but Paul said he also won the victory over 'law'. The amazing thing about Easter is that on his return Jesus did not take revenge: he offered forgiveness. The perpetrators were not held to account, they were offered the same hope as all of us.

Easter is the hope that is the answer to the weariness of sorrow.





Good Friday

On Friday we were blessed with beautiful weather for our Walk of Witness. There were approximately 30 walkers from a mixed age group as well as a very special dog who came as an assistance dog to one of our church members. The walk was led by David Pickup and we stopped to pray at the school car park, the War Memorial gates, the village hall, the Methodist chapel, and the pond. Several people took it in turns to carry the cross. On arrival in church Revd Phil led us in a simple service during which the children made the Easter Garden under the altar. You can see it in church today. Well done and thankyou everybody.

After the service we put up a wooden cross by Oxford Road for all who pass by to see. You are welcome to lay flowers there today. The cross will return to the churchyard tomorrow with any floral tributes. The words on the cross are John 3:16

For God so loved the world that he gave his one and only son, that whoever believes in him shall not perish, but have eternal life'
