Luke 1:46-55

Mary's song

⁴⁶ And Mary said:

'My soul glorifies the Lord

- and my spirit rejoices in God my Saviour,
- ⁴⁸ for he has been mindful of the humble state of his servant.

From now on all generations will call me blessed,

- for the Mighty One has done great things for me holy is his name.
- ⁵⁰ His mercy extends to those who fear him, from generation to generation.
- ⁵¹ He has performed mighty deeds with his arm; he has scattered those who are proud in their inmost thoughts.
- ⁵² He has brought down rulers from their thrones but has lifted up the humble.
- 53 He has filled the hungry with good things but has sent the rich away empty.
- 54 He has helped his servant Israel, remembering to be merciful
- 55 to Abraham and his descendants for ever, just as he promised our ancestors.'

Mary is the most well-known mother in the Bible and the best example too. However, there are many other mothers whose example we can celebrate and learn from as well. So in the service today we will be looking at the story of Ruth because there is a lot that is relevant to our modern society too.

Ruth

Naomi was a widow, and both her sons had died as well. She did not want to be alone, but she didn't want to be a burden either. Her daughter in law, Ruth, promised to stay with her, and to go with her wherever she went, because they were a family.

Ruth did stay faithful to Naomi, and in turn, Naomi was able to introduce her to a man who would love her and marry her. They had a child, and then grandchildren, and then great grandchildren — and one of Ruth's great grandsons became King David, the great shepherd-King of God's people. And then, fourteen generations later, Ruth and Naomi's growing family included a man named Joseph, who married a woman called Mary, who had a son named Jesus...



Ruth and Naomi were heroic bible mums because they had the courage and the faithfulness to make a new family out of their sadness — and so their story became part of a much, much bigger story.

The book of Ruth is in the Old Testament. It is only four chapters long so it can be read in one sitting. You will find it tucked between Judges and the First Book of Samuel.

Coffee Cup news

From today until the end of April our coffee cup collections will be given to **Aylesbury Homeless Action Group.** AHAG is a local charity based in Rickfords Hill in Aylesbury. It provides support and advice to those who are homeless; at risk of becoming homeless; or who are inadequately housed.

Examples of services offered are:

- One to one appointments with a support worker to discuss housing options and develop a plan of action.
- A weekly surgery offering advice and support about benefits.
- Mental health support from a trained mental health worker.
- Vouchers can be issued for use at the local foodbank.
- A new drop in advice service every Friday at Aylesbury Library 9:30 12:30

From January to December 2023 AHAG supported 490 people of whom 289 also had mental health issues.
