

One of our church members, Clare Davey, ran this LINK between Mulago Hospital, Kampala, Uganda and the Royal Free Hospital, London, for ten years.

Mark 10:17-31

The rich and the kingdom of God

- ¹⁷ As Jesus started on his way, a man ran up to him and fell on his knees before him. 'Good teacher,' he asked, 'what must I do to inherit eternal life?'
- ¹⁸ 'Why do you call me good?' Jesus answered. 'No one is good except God alone. ¹⁹ You know the commandments: "You shall not murder, you shall not commit adultery,
- you shall not steal, you shall not give false testimony, you shall not defraud, honour your father and mother."
- ²⁰ 'Teacher,' he declared, 'all these I have kept since I was a boy.'
- ²¹ Jesus looked at him and loved him. 'One thing you lack,' he said. 'Go, sell everything you have and give to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven. Then come, follow me.'
- ²² At this the man's face fell. He went away sad, because he had great wealth.
- ²³ Jesus looked round and said to his disciples, 'How hard it is for the rich to enter the kingdom of God!'
- ²⁴ The disciples were amazed at his words. But Jesus said again, 'Children, how hard it is to enter the kingdom of God! ²⁵ It is easier for a camel to go through the eye of a needle than for someone who is rich to enter the kingdom of God.'
- ²⁶ The disciples were even more amazed, and said to each other, 'Who then can be saved?'
- ²⁷ Jesus looked at them and said, 'With man this is impossible, but not with God; all things are possible with God.'
- ²⁸ Then Peter spoke up, 'We have left everything to follow you!'
- ²⁹ 'Truly I tell you,' Jesus replied, 'no one who has left home or brothers or sisters or mother or father or children or fields for me and the gospel ³⁰ will fail to receive a hundred times as much in this present age: homes, brothers, sisters, mothers, children and fields along with persecutions and in the age to come eternal life. ³¹ But many who are first will be last, and the last first.'

After seeing the rich young man's sadness, Jesus stated how difficult it is for rich people to enter the kingdom of God. He did not mean only the poor can enter the kingdom of God, he is reminding us to love the Lord first and foremost. It's the first and greatest commandment. People who make wealth and possessions their goal are placing something else above God. Jesus also teaches us we cannot earn our salvation. Both rich and poor can go to heaven, but not because of anything they did. None of our good deeds will save us, only God's grace will do that, and that is something none of us can boast about because it is a free gift. So it is the attitude of our hearts that matter.
