John 1:43 - 51

Jesus Calls Philip and Nathanael

- ⁴³ The next day Jesus decided to leave for Galilee. Finding Philip, he said to him, "Follow me."
- ⁴⁴ Philip, like Andrew and Peter, was from the town of Bethsaida. ⁴⁵ Philip found Nathanael and told him, "We have found the one Moses wrote about in the Law, and about whom the prophets also wrote—Jesus of Nazareth, the son of Joseph."
- ⁴⁶ "Nazareth! Can anything good come from there?" Nathanael asked.
- "Come and see," said Philip.
- ⁴⁷ When Jesus saw Nathanael approaching, he said of him, "Here truly is an Israelite in whom there is no deceit."
- ⁴⁸ "How do you know me?" Nathanael asked.

Jesus answered, "I saw you while you were still under the fig tree before Philip called you."

- ⁴⁹ Then Nathanael declared, "Rabbi, you are the Son of God; you are the king of Israel."
- ⁵⁰ Jesus said, "You believe because I told you I saw you under the fig tree. You will see greater things than that." ⁵¹ He then added, "Very truly I tell you, you will see 'heaven open, and the angels of God ascending and descending on' the Son of Man."

Up to this point Jesus has only gained followers who had already been disciples of John the Baptist, but now he actively seeks out Philip and calls him to follow. Philip then responds by finding Nathanael and declaring that Jesus is the one that Moses and the prophets had written about.

We can see that good news is for sharing. As soon as he had met and understood something of Jesus' identity Philip went and shared it with someone he knew. John is showing us that the appropriate response to meeting and knowing Jesus is to share him with others. When Nathanael initially shows scepticism Philip does not get into a deep discussion. He simply echoes Jesus' words to Andrew and Simon Peter earlier in the chapter 'Come and See'.

And that's how it has worked ever since. One person says to another, "I follow Jesus and invite you to do so too". It's always person-to-person. We too can witness to Jesus without knowing or understanding everything about him. We simply need to invite our friends to 'Come and See'.



Dear God, give us the courage to share what we know and enjoy about our life of faith with others, trusting that you will take care of the rest. In Jesus' name, Amen.

Coffee Cup collection



The Archdeacon of Buckingham's Clergy Charity supports local clergy and their families who are in financial need, hardship or distress. The emotional and other demands on our clergy continue to increase and the effect of the Covid pandemic and continuing economic challenges has meant more clergy families are in need of practical support.

Grants have been provided for unexpected medical and dental charges, urgent house repairs, kitchen equipment etc. The Trust employs a member of staff who visits clergy widows and also co-ordinates the work of the volunteer visitors.

The Trust raises its income from collections and donations throughout the year from parishes within the Archdeaconry.

Community Christmas Day lunch

A lot of preparation and planning went into making the Christmas Day lunch a success, and much of that started in September. This year 62 volunteers were recruited for a variety of tasks. They wrapped 120 presents; peeled and sliced 50kg of vegetables; transformed the church into a large full service restaurant; and served 132 guests with a three course Christmas meal. That is an increase of 20% in the number of guests from the previous year.

Entertainment was provided by an amazing ukulele band and a local ladies choir. Free haircuts and nail painting were also available.
