#### Mark 11:1-11

#### Jesus Comes to Jerusalem as King

11 As they approached Jerusalem and came to Bethphage and Bethany at the Mount of Olives, Jesus sent two of his disciples, <sup>2</sup> saying to them, "Go to the village ahead of you, and just as you enter it, you will find a colt tied there, which no one has ever ridden. Untie it and bring it here. <sup>3</sup> If anyone asks you, 'Why are you doing this?' say, 'The Lord needs it and will send it back here shortly.'"

<sup>4</sup> They went and found a colt outside in the street, tied at a doorway. As they untied it, <sup>5</sup> some people standing there asked, "What are you doing, untying that colt?" <sup>6</sup> They answered as Jesus had told them to, and the people let them go. <sup>7</sup> When they brought the colt to Jesus and threw their cloaks over it, he sat on it. <sup>8</sup> Many people spread their cloaks on the road, while others spread branches they had cut in the fields. <sup>9</sup> Those who went ahead and those who followed shouted,

"Hosanna!"

"Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord!"

<sup>10</sup> "Blessed is the coming kingdom of our father David!"

"Hosanna in the highest heaven!"

<sup>11</sup> Jesus entered Jerusalem and went into the temple courts. He looked around at everything, but since it was already late, he went out to Bethany with the Twelve.

Palm Sunday is a strange festival. It's a celebration of Jesus as King, but even as we celebrate, we are aware of the next part of the story. The crowds at first cheered Jesus, then turned on him when he was not the military conqueror they expected.

We have the benefit of the bible telling us all this, so we can see it as the journey of Jesus to the cross. But the clues were all there at the time: the King arriving into Jerusalem was on a donkey, not a war horse. The welcoming crowd got a different kind of king from what they were expecting - infinitely more powerful, yet vastly more humble. The week took a different turn in just a matter of days - Jesus would be executed as a criminal, silent before his abusers, humiliated and tortured.

Lent is a good time to be asking, what is our own mental or emotional picture of God? If we are honest we can want God to be like a fairy-godmother who waves a magic wand and takes away all the pain and suffering we see in the world today.

Instead we see a God who **takes the pain on himself**, who walks the journey of Holy Week, and goes deeper into a darkness we cannot enter. God in Jesus lets his friends deny and betray him. God in Jesus suffers rejection and abuse, and the ultimate desolation of a lonely yet innocent death – and he did it all for us.

So, this Palm Sunday let us ask ourselves: what more could we expect from God than that? (summarised and adapted from a reflection by Justin Welby)
