## **Prison Fellowship (**episode four)

This is a Christian charity that believes nobody is beyond hope. Its mission is 'to show Christ's love to people in prison by coming alongside them and supporting them'.

Angel Tree is a national PF project that gives parents in prison the opportunity to send a Christmas present to their children. In 2023, PF sent out 5,172 gifts in England and Wales! This year PF is aiming to top that.

The **Angel Tree** project will be running in HMP Aylesbury and the local PF prayer group has already started planning for it. Even though it is still July there is a lot to do between now and December. Aylesbury also faces an extra challenge as this is the first year it will be running Angel Tree since changing from a Young Offenders prison (not many children) to an adult category prison with many, many more children. The take up rate is not yet known so the Aylesbury PF group are stepping out in faith here!

Prison Fellowship volunteers work with prison chaplains and local churches to buy, wrap and deliver the presents. As long as prisoners are allowed access to their children, they are given the opportunity to apply for a gift to be sent to them.


Each gift is dispatched as though it is from the parent in prison and is accompanied by a personal message written by the parent for their child to make the gift extra special. The parent is also given the option of including an age-appropriate Christian story book in their child's gift.

There are around 312,000 children in England and Wales with a parent in prison. That means more than double the number of children are affected by parental imprisonment than divorce in the family. When a parent is taken away to prison a child can feel abandoned, unloved, and wondering if they did something wrong themselves.

**Angel Tree** is a very simple and incredibly rewarding way to help parents in prison stay in contact with their families during imprisonment, which can contribute to reducing re-offending rates. People in prison being visited by a partner or family member have a 52% re-offending rate as compared to 70% for those who do not.\*

#### John 6:1-21

#### Jesus Feeds the Five Thousand

6 Some time after this, Jesus crossed to the far shore of the Sea of Galilee (that is, the Sea of Tiberias), <sup>2</sup> and a great crowd of people followed him because they saw the signs he had performed by healing the sick. <sup>3</sup> Then Jesus went up on a mountainside and sat down with his disciples. <sup>4</sup> The Jewish Passover Festival was near.

<sup>5</sup> When Jesus looked up and saw a great crowd coming toward him, he said to Philip, "Where shall we buy bread for these people to eat?" <sup>6</sup> He asked this only to test him, for he already had in mind what he was going to do.



<sup>7</sup> Philip answered him, "It would take more than half a year's wages to buy enough bread for each one to have a bite!"

<sup>8</sup> Another of his disciples, Andrew, Simon Peter's brother, spoke up, <sup>9</sup> "Here is a boy with five small barley loaves and two small fish, but how far will they go among so many?"

<sup>10</sup> Jesus said, "Have the people sit down." There was plenty of grass in that place, and they sat down (about five thousand men were there). <sup>11</sup> Jesus then took the loaves, gave thanks, and distributed to those who were seated as much as they wanted. He did the same with the fish.

<sup>12</sup> When they had all had enough to eat, he said to his disciples, "Gather the pieces that are left over. Let nothing be wasted." <sup>13</sup> So they gathered them and filled twelve baskets with the pieces of the five barley loaves left over by those who had eaten.

<sup>14</sup> After the people saw the sign Jesus performed, they began to say, "Surely this is the Prophet who is to come into the world." <sup>15</sup> Jesus, knowing that they intended to come and make him king by force, withdrew again to a mountain by himself.

#### Jesus Walks on the Water

<sup>16</sup> When evening came, his disciples went down to the lake, <sup>17</sup> where they got into a boat and set off across the lake for Capernaum. By now it was dark, and Jesus had not yet joined them. <sup>18</sup> A strong wind was blowing and the waters grew rough. <sup>19</sup> When they had rowed about three or four miles, they saw Jesus approaching the boat, walking on the water; and they were frightened.
