The ICEH is a global network, delivering excellence in research, education and capacity to improve eye health worldwide through collaborative partnerships.

Low and middle-income countries experience most of the vision loss but have fewer trained healthcare professionals to deal with the problem. One of the programmes of the ICEH is the very successful VISION 2020 LINKS & Networks Programme, which aims to build long-term partnerships between eye care institutions in the UK and those in low and middle-income countries.

Clare Davey ran the LINK between Mulago Hospital, Kampala, Uganda and the Royal Free Hospital, London, between 2010 and 2020. Do look at the display of photographs at the back of the church which have been kindly provided by Terry Cooper who joined the LINK team in 2015 as project manager and photographer and in a survey of diabetic retinopathy.


## It's measuring time!

#### James 5:13-20

## The prayer of faith

<sup>13</sup> Is anyone among you in trouble? Let them pray. Is anyone happy? Let them sing songs of praise. <sup>14</sup> Is anyone among you ill? Let them call the elders of the church to pray over them and anoint them with oil in the name of the Lord. <sup>15</sup> And the prayer offered in faith will make the sick person well; the Lord will raise them up. If they have sinned, they will be forgiven. <sup>16</sup> Therefore confess your sins to each other and pray for each other so that you may be healed. The prayer of a righteous person is powerful and effective.

<sup>17</sup> Elijah was a human being, even as we are. He prayed earnestly that it would not rain, and it did not rain on the land for three and a half years. <sup>18</sup> Again he prayed, and the heavens gave rain, and the earth produced its crops.

<sup>19</sup> My brothers and sisters, if one of you should wander from the truth and someone should bring that person back, <sup>20</sup> remember this: whoever turns a sinner from the error of their way will save them from death and cover over a multitude of sins.

This week we are taking a break from the gospel reading and looking instead at the epistle reading set for the day. The word 'epistle' means 'letter' and in the New Testament there are twenty one letters written by the apostles to various churches or individuals. This letter, written by James, gives practical advice to Jewish Christians 'scattered abroad' on how to live for Christ. These are the closing verses of the letter, and they remind us of the importance of prayer.

We all experience times of trouble, times of joy, and times of illness. Also, we all make mistakes or bad choices from time to time. When we pray we can bring all of these to God so we no longer feel weighed down by them. God is always ready to hear our prayers for ourselves and for each other. There is no wrong way to pray if we genuinely open our heart to God.

Our prayers may be answered straight away, but often they are not. We must wait. We might feel as though nothing is happening, or wonder if God heard us. Yet when we look back, we can see he was helping us all along, and our prayers may have already been answered in unexpected ways. Some people like to keep a diary of their prayer requests so they can look back and see how God has helped them. When we can look back like this, we learn to trust in Him even more when we face future challenges or uncertainties.

NOTE: Elijah prayed for no rain in 1 Kings 17 and prayed again for rain in 1 Kings 18. It is an amazing story and is well worth reading both chapters in their entirety.
