

Mark 16:1-8

Jesus has risen

16 When the Sabbath was over, Mary Magdalene, Mary the mother of James, and Salome bought spices so that they might go to anoint Jesus' body. ² Very early on the first day of the week, just after sunrise, they were on their way to the tomb ³ and they asked each other, 'Who will roll the stone away from the entrance of the tomb?'

⁴ But when they looked up, they saw that the stone, which was very large, had been rolled away. ⁵ As they entered the tomb, they saw a young man dressed in a white robe sitting on the right side, and they were alarmed.

⁶ 'Don't be alarmed,' he said. 'You are looking for Jesus the Nazarene, who was crucified. He has risen! He is not here. See the place where they laid him. ⁷ But go, tell his disciples and Peter, "He is going ahead of you into Galilee. There you will see him, just as he told you."'

⁸Trembling and bewildered, the women went out and fled from the tomb. They said nothing to anyone, because they were afraid.



Unlike Christmas, Easter is recorded in and is the climax of all four Gospels.

Mark says everything he wants to say about the most important event in history in just 8 verses. It is so short that those who copied Mark's gospel felt obliged to add an additional 8 verses to say what happened next.

Mark tells us that at the earliest possible time three women attended the grave to anoint the body. The story points to their dedication, but also their powerlessness – they would not be able to roll away the stone.

The women in Mark's gospel are always present. Their dedication is noted, as is their powerlessness. While the men jostle for power, the women serve. When the men run away, the women stay.

They are the least in the community and it is no accident they are the first to hear of the resurrection. Jesus told them that the last shall be first.

Mark's point is that resurrection transforms everything. Death is overcome and good news comes to the powerless.

The women are overwhelmed and run away saying nothing to anyone. This leaves the story hanging and this is deliberate. The story is no longer just theirs; it is ours. The question for us is how we are to live as people who know that Christ has risen.

We may feel powerless and insignificant, but we have this treasure of joy, and hope. What are we to do with it?
