

#### Matthew 6:25-33

#### Do Not Worry

<sup>25</sup> "Therefore I tell you, do not worry about your life, what you will eat or drink; or about your body, what you will wear. Is not life more than food, and the body more than clothes? <sup>26</sup> Look at the birds of the air; they do not sow or reap or store away in barns, and yet your heavenly Father feeds them. Are you not much more valuable than they? <sup>27</sup> Can any one of you by worrying add a single hour to your life?

<sup>28</sup> "And why do you worry about clothes? See how the flowers of the field grow. They do not labour or spin. <sup>29</sup> Yet I tell you that not even Solomon in all his splendour was dressed like one of these. <sup>30</sup> If that is how God clothes the grass of the field, which is here today and tomorrow is thrown into the fire, will he not much more clothe you—you of little faith? <sup>31</sup> So do not worry, saying, 'What shall we eat?' or 'What shall we drink?' or 'What shall we wear?' <sup>32</sup> For the pagans run after all these things, and your heavenly Father knows that you need them. <sup>33</sup> But seek first his kingdom and his righteousness, and all these things will be given to you as well.

Jesus tells us not to worry about our life, or about material things. Yes, we should act responsibly and think ahead and plan ahead, but we should not WORRY ahead. Jesus tells us to trust in our Heavenly Father to provide for us because he already knows what we need. We cannot change anything for the better by worrying. There is a quote from Corrie Ten Boom the famous Dutch Christian lady who was sent to a concentration camp by the Nazis for hiding Jews during the war:

## 'worry does not empty tomorrow of sorrow, but it empties today of strength'.

So, let's learn to live one day at a time and learn to trust in God 'seek first his kingdom and his righteousness, and all these things will be given to you as well'.



Lord, please put Your peace in my heart.
I sometimes get worried and anxious.
Calm me, Lord.
Slow me down, put Your peace in my heart.
No matter what problem I have, Lord,
You are bigger,
You are more powerful than it is.
So I bring my problem to You.
