Mark 3:20-35

Jesus Accused by His Family and by Teachers of the Law

²⁰ Then Jesus entered a house, and again a crowd gathered, so that he and his disciples were not even able to eat. ²¹ When his family heard about this, they went to take charge of him, for they said, "He is out of his mind."

²² And the teachers of the law who came down from Jerusalem said, "He is possessed by Beelzebul! By the prince of demons he is driving out demons."

²³ So Jesus called them over to him and began to speak to them in parables: "How can Satan drive out Satan? ²⁴ If a kingdom is divided against itself, that kingdom cannot stand. ²⁵ If a house is divided against itself, that house cannot stand. ²⁶ And if Satan opposes himself and is divided, he cannot stand; his end has come. ²⁷ In fact, no one can enter a strong man's house without first tying him up. Then he can plunder the strong man's house. ²⁸ Truly I tell you, people can be forgiven all their sins and every slander they utter, ²⁹ but whoever blasphemes against the Holy Spirit will never be forgiven; they are guilty of an eternal sin."

³⁰ He said this because they were saying, "He has an impure spirit."

³¹ Then Jesus' mother and brothers arrived. Standing outside, they sent someone in to call him. ³² A crowd was sitting around him, and they told him, "Your mother and brothers are outside looking for you."

³³ "Who are my mother and my brothers?" he asked.

³⁴ Then he looked at those seated in a circle around him and said, "Here are my mother and my brothers! ³⁵ Whoever does God's will is my brother and sister and mother."

As the crowds following Jesus became ever larger and more intrusive his family became concerned. This was all getting out of hand – there was no time or space for Jesus and his disciples to rest and eat – and the religious authorities were starting to notice. In this passage there are three possible explanations for Jesus behaviour.

Was he mad? - was he possessed? - was he the Son of God?

Even Jesus' family were struggling to understand him. They were concerned about him. He had left the security and safety of a carpentry business and was on course to clash with the orthodox authorities. He had gathered a group of followers who would add nothing to his career prospects. In choosing to live by the gospel we too run the risk of being misunderstood and ridiculed.



Lord Jesus, you faced opposition with determination and courage. Grant us the grace to follow you resolutely, even if the strongest opposition comes from those who are nearest and dearest to us.

The General Election

The Church of England is launching a campaign known as <u>#PrayYourPart</u> – to promote prayer and participation in the life of our nation and communities, both as voters and as citizens. They also issue a plea to everyone to put "good grace and a commitment to truth and integrity" at the heart of the campaign. Sadly, this week has not shown much of that.

A series of daily reflections written by bishops, drawn from the Bible and exploring major themes has just been published. It covers the final three weeks up to polling day starting on 14th June.
