Luke 2:22-40

Jesus Presented in the Temple

²² When the time came for the purification rites required by the Law of Moses, Joseph and Mary took him to Jerusalem to present him to the Lord ²³ (as it is written in the Law of the Lord, "Every firstborn male is to be consecrated to the Lord"), ²⁴ and to offer a sacrifice in keeping with what is said in the Law of the Lord: "a pair of doves or two young pigeons."

²⁵ Now there was a man in Jerusalem called Simeon, who was righteous and devout. He was waiting for the consolation of Israel, and the Holy Spirit was on him. ²⁶ It had been revealed to him by the Holy Spirit that he would not die before he had seen the Lord's Messiah. ²⁷ Moved by the Spirit, he went into the temple courts. When the parents brought in the child Jesus to do for him what the custom of the Law required, ²⁸ Simeon took him in his arms and praised God, saying:



29 "Sovereign Lord, as you have promised, you may now dismiss your servant in peace.
30 For my eyes have seen your salvation,
31 which you have prepared in the sight of all nations:
32 a light for revelation to the Gentiles, and the glory of your people Israel."

³³ The child's father and mother marvelled at what was said about him. ³⁴ Then Simeon blessed them and said to Mary, his mother: "This child is destined to cause the falling and rising of many in Israel, and to be a sign that will be spoken against, ³⁵ so that the thoughts of many hearts will be revealed. And a sword will pierce your own soul too."

³⁶ There was also a prophet, Anna, the daughter of Penuel, of the tribe of Asher. She was very old; she had lived with her husband seven years after her marriage, ³⁷ and then was a widow until she was eighty-four. She never left the temple but worshipped night and day, fasting and praying. ³⁸ Coming up to them at that very moment, she gave thanks to God and spoke about the child to all who were looking forward to the redemption of Jerusalem.

³⁹ When Joseph and Mary had done everything required by the Law of the Lord, they returned to Galilee to their own town of Nazareth. ⁴⁰ And the child grew and became strong; he was filled with wisdom, and the grace of God was on him.

The words spoken by Simeon in verses 29-32 are well known because they are used in the Prayer Book Evening service and are known as the 'Nunc Dimittis'. Simeon was an old man who had waited his whole life for the promised Messiah to come. Having now recognised the baby Jesus for who he was he was content to 'depart in peace'.

Forty days after Jesus was born, Mary and Joseph took him to be presented in the Temple in Jerusalem. Because of this the official name in the Church of England for today is: **The Presentation of Christ in the Temple**. If you count 40 days from Christmas, this gets you to 2 February, which happens to fall on a Sunday this year. Jesus was presented in the Temple because it was required in the Old Testament (Leviticus 12).

Today is also known as **The Purification of Saint Mary the Virgin**. According to the Law of Moses, a mother who had given birth to a son remained unclean for forty days after birth. After this time the new mother was to bring to the temple a sacrificial young pigeon or turtle dove (Leviticus 12). Then a priest would pray for her, and she was cleansed.

The third name for today is **Candlemas.** It comes from the use of candles to celebrate Jesus as the light of the world. When Jesus was presented in the Temple, Simeon recognised the baby Jesus as 'a light for revelation to the Gentiles' (Luke 2:32). By tradition all the church candles for the year are brought for blessing on this day. Candlemas is the moment in the church year when we '<u>turn from the crib to the cross</u>', remembering that Jesus came into the worl to die for our sins. Christmas and Epiphany are behind us and so we turn our attention towards Lent and Easter at this point.

Finally - have you seen the snowdrops that are coming through in the churchyard? And did you know they are also called 'Candlemas bells?
